In this part of the instruction you will gain a better understanding of how your subject fits into a broader field of research.

You will also learn how to discover key terms relating to your subject.

And it is also good to know early on which terms are absolutely *not* relevant to your subject.

A final tip: make sure you always take notes during your research! Write down your key terms and document your results. This way you can always retrace and repeat your steps, make improvements, and you will still know later on where you found useful results.
