

Jeffrey Sachs' Model Villages

8 Kenyan villages, 5000 people for example: Sauri

Fight for survival Hunger, Aids, malaria

Provision in maize needed (staple food)

Situation has deteriorated: fertilizer is no longer used

Need for Investments

Agriculture

Fertilizer, improvement of soil, irrigation, better seeds

Healthcare

Village clinics, mosquito nets, medicine

Education

Meals, professional educations, computer skills


(solved in Europe by for example the industrial revolution)

When did it start and why?

Industrial Revolution – Sachs

Commercial, technological and industrial revolution in the Middle Ages - Landes

In 1820 all areas of the world were poor, by 1998 all had grown (however: the growth was average)

Led to the development of Western Welfare states)



A moral/ethical problem

History shows a variation in wealth and poverty

This is illustrated by varying centre's of technology, power, culture and wealth (e.g China till about 1500)

20th of January 1949: President Truman

No imperialism, exploitation for profit anymore, but a program of development based on democratic fair dealing"

In the context of the Cold War: green revolution instead of a red revolution





Conclusion

Fight against poverty is based on European (ancient Geek/ Jewish-Christian) idealism of equality

Ethics of Development

Does it matter

if world poverty was the "normal human pattern" that Europe defeated itself by means of an "abnormal human pattern"? or if the rise of Europe has supported, or even caused world poverty problems?

In the second case, the moral pressure is ethically stronger.
